REGARDING PART TIME MINISTRY

I have always said, "There is no such thing as part time pastoral ministry, only full time pastoral ministry partly done." Living as I do three hours from Immanuel also adds to this challenge. Here are some of my current goals:

- 1) To continue to work with the Transition Team to identify possible activities and issues that might become a part of the significant use of this "in-between time." These are "congregation" concerns, not "pastor" concerns...remember: *Transition* is about the congregation; *Call* is about the pastor.
- 2) To work with the *LifeKeys* material to increase our knowing of ourselves and of one another, and in so doing, to increase our trust and function as a community of believers and servants. This is a "work-book" resource, which means that it is a guide for how we "work" to reach these results.
- 3) To identify for upcoming weeks, possible "questions" that we need to be asking ourselves as to how and why we function the way we do, especially organizationally. The Transition Team has produced an historical review to help provide a visual aid for locating some possible matters for our discussion.
- 4) To work with the Worship Committee to identify basic worship goals for these weeks. We are mostly following the current format. However, there are three differences. 1. It has been decided (with the positive feedback from our common worship on Reformation Sunday) to make every 5th Sunday a common worship at 9:00 a.m. joint worship with common fellowship hour following. 2. It has been decided to offer the surrounding community a Blue Christmas Service on December 10 at 4:00 p.m. in order to provide an opportunity for people who have faced a significant loss or crisis to give place to those "blue moods" in the midst of the Christmas Season. 3. Since Christmas Eve falls on a Sunday, it was decided to maximize our worship resources with two Christmas Eve Services: a Family Service at 10:00 a.m. and a Candlelight Service at 10:00 p.m.
- 5) To work with the Church Council in developing a nomination-election process for a Call Committee. A process was decided which would provide opportunity for members to be involved in personal thought and choice in whom and why persons might be considered for this important task. At last review, the process was only partially followed which limited our nominations. The election meeting for the congregation was re-set for December 17 following the second worship service.
- 6) To maintain visitation as a priority as much as time allows. I have strived for a balance of visitors and members as well as former members, personal needs of families and individual, hospital and home based pastoral care, and finally, referrals and requests from members for relatives and friends.
- 7) To maintain my home commitment to my "part time" status by taking the agreed upon weekends. I did serve the first eight weeks in a row to help establish a pastor-parish relationship, and both discover and provide a sense of "pastoral presence" in the Immanuel fellowship and surrounding community. Part of this is to help open the way for a broader ministry for the congregation with future pastoral leadership.

I have been "promoting' a sense of vision for Immanuel that we see ourselves not "out here in the middle of nowhere," but as "out here in the middle of somewhere." This is based on the fact that we are map-wise at the juncture of three main roads, out of which and into which funnel numerous "tributaries" for witness and service. Thus, the theme "The Church at the Cross-Roads" reflects both a sense of faith-based reality and real community-based witness and service. In encourage the congregation to "live with this notion" for the next few weeks, and to listen to how this might impact the way we think about ourselves as a congregation and the way we think about the strengths of a pastor we might choose to serve us going forward.

One of Pastor Barden's first learning-by-listening concerns is that the Nooksack Valley and surrounding hills and valleys have experienced considerable loss and crisis over the years, including some very tragic events. The depth of grief in these kinds of situations takes years to heal and to find "the new normal," if even it ever can happen. Including those who have suffered loss or challenge in this current year, this service seeks to give place for the integrity of these feelings and to surround them with hope.

Blue is the color we give to our "down mood" for this and other human dynamics. Blue is also the church's color for Hope. While the rest of the world is chanting *Merry* Christmas, and *Happy* Holidays, these blue moments take the edge off our seasonal celebrations. The purpose of the service is this to provide what we might call a "blending of the blues" in order to surround our life concerns with the hope and blessings of God's love and grace, mercy and peace.

We encourage members to make this a priority for any such moods in their own life story, and to extend the information and invitation to any whom it might serve in our extended families, persons with whom we work and play in our community, and those we may know from our own neighborhoods The initial response to this has already been extremely positive, and the vision is that this could become an annual service that could grow in its significance and meaning for this whole area.

The earlier hour on a Sunday was chosen to provide a choice for those active in the afternoon on Sunday and for those who require evening hours for home activities.

A FAMILY FOCUSED CHRISTMAS EVE SERVICE DECEMBER 24, 10:00 a.m.

The special hour was chosen as a mid-morning Christmas Eve hour, with a special service to honor children and families in their hearing and celebrating the Christmas Gospel story. Pastor Barden will utilize the sermon time to give a joint adult and children message. The theme will be "Let's Open the Gift Together."

A TRADITIONAL CHRISTMAS EVE CANDLELIGHT SERVICE--DECEMBER 24, 10:00 p.m.

Carols and Candlelight have traditionally provided a more reflective atmosphere for the reading and hearing of the Christmas Story. Pastor Barden will preach by candlelight and prepare us for "spreading the light" one to one throughout the congregation. When the Service of the Word and Light is over, we will celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Table. All will be accompanied by the singing of many of our Christmas Carols.

THE LIFEKEYS STUDY: "DISCOVER WHO YOUR ARE"

This study has received good response and good discussion. It has been difficult to lead because the workbooks did not arrive on time, and so working with them has not been able to flow well. Even so, we have used the Adult Ed / Fellowship Hour to serve as the place to capture the basics of this material for ourselves and for one another. We will finish this initial portion on December 17. Perhaps we will negotiate a Saturday morning workshop or a Sunday potluck and afternoon workshop where we can "put it all together" and together draw out the implications for Immanuel in our life and ministry together, as well as any hints of what this might mean in the selecting of the new pastor. If this all goes well, a record of our "giftedness by person as well as by categories could become a "resource bank" for future involvement.

Longing for the Light

We are living during the wet and rainy winter of the year that longs for the light to

return to the world. A cold world that has seen far too many mass killings, sexual assaults, bullying, war and murder.

One of the things I admire most about Luther was his capacity to embrace the winter of his own life by acknowledging his own personal depravity. It was in coming face to face with his own shadow that he discovered the light of God's grace.

I have always counted it a great gift that I had the privilege of doing my Clinical Pastoral Education under the supervision of Dr. William A Miller. Bill wrote the book, "Making Friends With Your Shadow" where he makes the case that all of us have a shadow side to our lives. The classical understanding is that our shadow side is opposite and equal to what we display in public..

This is why it is so shocking when we discover the shadow of someone we hold in high regard.

When people refuse to own their shadow and reveal it to the light it grows in intensity. We see this in the "goody two shoes" types who are often the most critical of their neighbors while appearing to be without fault. Such people work over time suppressing the full truth of their lives and often act in secret.

Jesus was very clear about the importance of knowing your own shadow. He would say things like, "Let he who is without sin cast the first stone." Or he would say, "Remove the log from your own eye before you remove the speck from your neighbors."

The church ought to be the one place in the community where we can struggle more

honestly about the challenges of being human. It ought to be a place that both helps us come to grips with the all of what it means to be human and holds us accountable for addressing our whole lives in healthy ways.

If acknowledging one's shadow improves the likelihood that one will not act on isn't it equally true that church and country must do the same?

I think the answer to this is Yes.

This is why the churches of the Northwest issued a letter of apology to the tribes for the horrible and unjust ways we have treated these brothers and sisters.

This is why the 500th Commemoration of the Reformation was a time for Lutherans to confess the horrible ways Luther depicted the Jews and for contributing to the violence that spread across Europe.

It is why delegations from the United States have gathered at Hiroshima and Nagasaki to commit to one another that never again will we unleash such deadly force upon another.

If we take seriously the Lutheran understanding of Saint and Sinner than we need to take more seriously how this same tension manifests itself in corporate ways as well as individual ways.

These are challenging times that we are living in. If we want to change let's begin with ourselves and own the truth of our own short comings. It is not just the other who needs to see the light. We all do.

The light came into the world and the darkness could not overcome it.

This is the true gift of Christmas.
